Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of injury-related death for North Dakota teens. Young driver inexperience, coupled with immaturity, often results in risk-taking behaviors such as speeding, alcohol use, and not wearing a seat belt – all of which contribute to an increased death rate.

In North Dakota, teen drivers age 14-19 account for 6% of all licensed drivers, but are behind the wheel in nearly 16% of all crashes.

The majority of teenagers involved in fatal crashes are unbuckled. In 2022,

50%

of teen drivers who died were unbuckled. Traffic crashes are a leading cause of death for teens. Impairment, passengers, distractions from mobile phones and navigation systems, speeding, and not wearing a seat belt are among the major contributing factors to the number of teen injuries and fatalities on our nation's roads each year.
